Catalog Description: A postulation approach to some Euclidean and non-Euclidean geometries. Topics include incidence and separation properties of planes and space, constructions with compass and straightedge, geometric inequalities, the parallel postulate, similarity theorems, circles, properties of triangles, and metric relationships.

Goals: This class will cover the development and history of Geometry from the work of Euclid through the discovery of hyperbolic geometry by Gauß, J. Bolyai, and Lobachevsky, and will explore the mathematical and philosophical consequences of this revolutionary discovery. In the process, and through the completion of homeworks, quizzes, and exams, the student will achieve the following goals:

- Enhance abstract and critical reasoning skills.
- Communicate mathematical ideas effectively.
- Demonstrate an understanding of key mathematical concepts.
